Better Communication, Improve Performance and Better Overall Control with Bob Burrelli



Join Bob Burrelli for a fun and interesting clinic! Designed to have the human obtain better communication, improve performance and better overall control Bob will discuss the myths and wrong thinking that is impacting our horses and confusing many in the horse world. Bob will back up scientifically his teaching with truth and prove it (not opinions) with his demonstrations. This will include all breeds. Bob is also excited to do a Question-and-Answer session if time allows.

Renowned clinician Bob Burrelli has over 40 years' experience in Natural Horsemanship. Bob is a licensed instructor, C.H.A. certified and the President of Bob Burrelli Academy of Natural Horsemanship at the Double B Ranch in Plymouth, MA.

9-10 AM Session 1: Groundwork for the Horse and Human (limited to 10 handlers) Sign up coming soon! - Bob is a firm believer in proper ground work to make the horse supple in every direction. We concentrate on six body parts to move individually of the others, to maintain proper balance. When this is done from the ground first, it makes sense to the horse when mounted.

10-11 AM Session 2: Horsemanship 1 (limited to 8 riders) Sign up coming soon! - Equitation (Classic Dressage Principles) is designed to help people further understand how to get along with a thinking, feeling, decision-making animal. This is done through love, language and leadership. They are designed to help people increase their awareness level of what they see and feel and to improve their timing so as to better communicate with a horse. This is called feel, timing and balance.

11 AM -12 PM Session 3: Advanced Horsemanship 2 (limited to 6 riders) Sign up coming soon! - This class is for advanced riders to understand how to execute proper feel and to do all the correct movements of shoulders in, haunches in, side pass, half pass, full pass, how to execute proper lead changes and more.

The Volunteer Horse Patrol serves the community by providing data to the state Department of Energy and Environmental Protection, and helping other user groups with general information, directions, and first aid.

Continued education and dialogue between all trail user groups (such as trail etiquette about how all user groups can safely interact on the trail) is crucial as more of us share fewer recreational trails. The Connecticut Horse Council created the Volunteer Horse Patrol (VHP) in 2003 to assist the state during a time of economic hardship.

The VHP has come a long way from its small start in 2003 of 5 patrol areas to over 100 areas around the state, including town parks, open spaces and land trusts. As we continue to grow, we are expanding our riding opportunities and helping to create long distance connecting trails. Congratulations to all members, because each of your patrol logs, no matter how many hours you patrol and maintain trails adds to the grander total of statewide hours. This service provides CHC, DEEP and other Land Management Areas with information on how the equestrian community is continuing its effort to maintain trails for multiple use, while promoting and educating the community and other equestrians of our volunteer efforts.

Members patrol local and other areas they are able to get to. There are no required hours – we ask that you log the hours you do ride so that they are included in our total that we submit to DEEP at the end of every year. The CHC-VHP provides safety vests that identify volunteers. Your membership is \$20.00 a year to the CHC. Members are asked to get certified with CPR & First Aid on their own. CONNECTICUT EQUINE ADVISORY COUNCIL



The Connecticut Equine Advisory Council was established on May 22, 2007 by <u>Public Act 07-42</u> to assist the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection with issues related to the preservation of equine trails in the state.

Membership: The council consists of the president of the Connecticut Horse Council and five representatives from organizations that serve the horse industry within each congressional district statewide in addition to one member of the Connecticut Forests and Parks Association, appointed by the minority leader of the Senate.

The mission of the Equine Advisory Council and is to promote equestrian use on public lands, creating, preserving, maintaining and restoring trails.

The CT Equine Advisory Council's website and link to the **Multi Use Trail Surface Study** and the **CT Horse Council's Volunteer Horse Patrol Trail User Study** can be viewed on: http://www.ct.gov/deep/eac under "Links" and on our CHC website. These studies can be used to educate and promote multi-use trails and surfaces for planners of trails who may play a role in maintaining or implementing trail systems including town planners, recreation committees and Council of Governments throughout the state.

TRAIL NEWS

The following trails reports are from members of the CT Equine Advisory Council meetings. If any CHC members need to report any dangerous trail conditions you can contact Dianne Ciano.

Larkin Bridle Trail:

CHC worked with DEEP to get some major trail work fixed on the trial system. Meg Sautter and Vevette Greenburg reports that the Towantic Road crossing has been improved as it was badly eroded, narrow and treacherous. DEEP also worked on drainage at the Rte. 67 area so that there is a better crossing over an old culvert. Gates were installed at Hawley Road. This may be an ongoing process at each crossing to keep out illegal off-road vehicles and yet still maintain emergency access to the trail system. There is a 40" passageway for horses. The crossing at Rte. 67 is very dangerous. CHC will work with the Town of Southbury & Naugatuck Valley Council of Government (NVCOG) to see if we can get flashing light installed.

Reports on trails are discussed at the CT Equine Advisory Council Meetings:

Larkin Bridal Trail -CHC is planning to contact the town of Southbury and the Naugatuck Valley Council of Government (COG) to see if we can get a lashing light installed at the Rte. 67 crossing

Bissel Trail, East Windsor: This trail runs long the CT River. Access is limited and the trail floods frequently in the spring and after heavy rain. It constantly needs clearing and there are steep and deep-water crossings. However, work has been done on sections near the power lines. This is a trail for experienced riders and horses.

Devil's Hop Yard State Park: CHC is working on getting better parking for horse trailers at the Mitchell Rd. area entrance..

The Preserve, Westport: The Bridal Land Conservancy is planning on building a bridge

12 Town Air Line State Park Trail Master Plan Workshops

CHC contacted members and organizations to notify them workshops that were open to the public on sections of the 12 Town ALSPT Master Plan regarding findings and recommendations with presentations of insights and findings from stakeholders and consulting team members. The sessions were designed to help accommodate stakeholders, businesses, event organizers and public.

Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Plan

CHC is working with DEEP on updating this state Plan. CT Horse Council Volunteer Horse Patrol Statistics will be added into this plan.

Legislation

At the CT Equine Advisory Council meetings, Legislation is discussed. Eric Hammerling, Executive Director for the CT Forest and Park Association (CFPA) who updates members on bills pertaining to trails:

The Legislative Session started January 4th and will run through June. The state budget is always of concern. CFPA will be monitoring this to make sure that the Environmental Committee has additional monies for our state parks and forests.

An effort is being made to raise staffing to adequate levels to accommodate dramatic increases in public use of recreational assets, facilities, and natural resources. For example, State Park staff ceiling is currently 83 full-time employees to care for 110 State Parks, 11 campgrounds, and abundant public facilities including 6 nature centers

An example in one area:

There is 1 Full time Supervisor and 1 Maintainer that covers 21,000 acres. This includes 8 Parks, 3 forests, 6 Boat Launches, 15 Wildlife Management Areas, the Hop River Airline Trail and 4 other sites!

Other Priorities:

- Continue state bonding investments for trails, open space, and agricultural land protection.
- Work with the Planning and Development Committee for a property tax reduction for private land owners who grant right of ways for Greenways.

CHC will notify the equestrian community when a bill #s come up for this and ask that as individuals you contact your legislators and state committees to support these bills

Members of the Connecticut Greenways Council are appointed by the Governor and the leaders of the General Assembly. Their duties include advising and assisting in the coordination of state agencies, municipalities, regional planning organizations and private citizens in voluntarily planning and implementing a system of greenways; providing assistance to state agencies, municipalities, regional planning organizations and private citizens in the technical aspects of planning, designing and implementing greenways, including advice on securing state, federal and nongovernmental grants; advising DEEP on selection of CT Recreational Trails Program grants; and establishing criteria for designation of greenways. Many Council members have had direct experience with trail and greenway development, and they can provide valuable insight into the development of successful local and regional projects.

What's a greenway?

A greenway is a corridor of open space that may protect natural resources, preserve scenic landscapes and historical resources or offer opportunities for recreation or nonmotorized transportation. A greenway may also connect existing protected areas and provide access to the outdoors; may be located along a defining natural feature, such as a waterway; along a man-made corridor, including an

unused right-of-way, traditional trail routes or historic barge canals; or may be a greenspace along a highway or around a village.

Greenways in Connecticut cover thousands of acres throughout every county in the state and may include paved or unpaved trail systems, ridgelines, or linked parcels of open space. Many other communities around Connecticut have chosen, through greenway designation, to recognize the importance of river corridors for natural resource protection, recreational opportunities, and scenic values. The CT Greenways Program contains details on how to propose designations, get assistance, and view a map of our State Greenways.

Your purchase of a Connecticut Greenways license plate will make a difference! These plates both raise the public awareness of the importance of our greenways AND provide funding for state and local efforts to preserve, restore and protect our greenways. Greenway systems offer an exciting opportunity to reestablish connections between the State's natural and cultural resource base and its people. It has been said that greenways connect the places we live to the places we love.

The CT Valley Driving Club has had a busy fall with monthly events to offer driving opportunities for its members as well as to attract new or interested drivers.

On Sept. 3, the club sponsored a "Fun Day" at members' lovely Greenbriar Farm which featured a cones course and three regulation marathon obstacles for drivers to practice. Drivers could go through each course as many times as they liked with tips from fellow drivers and some of admiring horse lovers on hand to watch the unjudged action.

On October 16, the CVDC, Litchfield Hills Driving Club and the Mid-Hudson Driving Club joined together to enjoy the foliage on the beautiful wide trails of the White Memorial Conservation Area in Litchfield, CT. A dozen turn-outs including a few riders followed two different routes following detailed maps prepared by Christine Schilling. One route was a flat 3-mile loop under pine trees and the other was a 7-mile loop to a cranberry pond and forest trails for drivers to explore. A picnic lunch provided for some mingling and exchanging of stories after the event.

Horse Owner's Corner-Timely Tips - WINTER is not that bad

The thought of winter has many fleeing to Florida for the indoor showing season. Some people don't have that option. Winter may seem like a harsh time but the changing of the seasons reminds us that it's a good time to Work on ideas for pet projects, Identify areas of concern, Note our goals for the year, Tackle some barn cleaning, Educate ourselves and relish spending time with your horse. Let's look at winter as an opportunity, not a problem!

We can:

- Work on ideas for pet projects. Is there something you've really been wanting to do? What is holding you back? Now is a good time to outline what you want to accomplish. Determine how much it may cost and write down the steps needed to reach your goals. Make sure your goals are SMART specific, measurable, achievable, relevant and time-based. You can come up with a plan. If your project isn't feasible at this time, determine an alternative solution that will help improve the situation for the time-being. Perhaps your goal was to have a curtain drain installed to help decrease water ponding but it's too expensive. Maybe instead you can find ways to divert the water away from the area of concern.
- **Identify areas of concern.** Are there hazards around the barn or property that need to be addressed? While snow may cover the pasture preventing you from identifying any hazards there, you can check fencing, areas that become muddy or icy and barn hazards that need to be dealt with and come up with a plan.
- Note our goals for the year. Winter is a great time to look back over the last year and determine
 what new goals we may have. Whether your goal is to go on the ultimate trail ride, attend that
 clinic, learn about that new subject or improve that skill, you can come up with a list of goals for
 the year, again making sure that they are SMART. Create a plan for each goal today.
- Tackle some barn cleaning. The weather outside may be frightful but most people keep their barn temperature more delightful even though that's not necessary for the horses themselves (they do best in 45 to 65 degrees F, according to studies). It's time to go in the barn, remove those cobwebs, tackle that clutter and come up with ideas to improve storage space if needed. This will also make the barn safer from a fire safety standpoint. Most barn fires occur in winter when the most bedding is stored and electrical use is high. It is often due to overloading circuits, faulty electrical systems and improperly stored hay.
- **Educate ourselves.** Attending a clinic, taking lessons, or taking an online or in-person course can help to increase your knowledge. You may also benefit just from reading a book. Find the approach that's best for you and start learning!
- Relish spending time with your horse. Although the weather may be too cold for you personally to ride or the conditions may prevent you from riding, you can take the time to bond more with your horse. You can groom your horse thoroughly, which your horse will probably enjoy. You could even teach your horse some new tricks! Remember to ask the horse to do something, then reward when it does it. You can use treats or praise. Put the treat in a bucket to prevent biting. Break it into steps if it is a complex task.

Winter can be a beautiful time. It gives us a chance to reset and perhaps even rest a little from the other busy season. Let's all use winter as a time to improve the lives of our horses and ourselves. https://animalscience.cahnr.uconn.edu/equine-extension-program/. 
